Sermon Introduction

Where in your life are you committed to a community? Maybe before expecting you to answer that question, I'd better define the term *community*. Here's one of the ways my laptop dictionary defines that term: *a feeling of fellowship with others, as a result of sharing common attitudes, interests, and goals*. With that in mind, I think of community as a group of people, relationally bound together by common affections, commitments, and endeavors, who love, care for, and challenge each other. That is, a community is a group of people who care deeply about each other, care deeply about things beyond themselves, and care enough to take action together.

So, with those thoughts in mind, where in your life are you committed to a community? That question may be harder to answer than you think it is. In our consumer-driven society, two questions most of us ask about any ingredient in our lives are these: *What's in it for me? What will I get out of it?*

But community—at least *true* community—is

not about *getting something out of it* (though, doubtless, there are benefits associated with being in true community), but rather about contributing, sharing, giving, loving, and serving.

Further, we're in an age that is quite rootless, and rootlessness results in superficiality. In fact, the writer Richard Foster began one of his books with this sentence: *Superficiality is the curse of our age* (see *Celebration of Discipline*). True community is based on depth and reality. As such, it cannot exist in connection with superficiality.

So, again, where in your life are you committed to a community? If you would live a life that matters, community is required. For that reason, (and *many others*), I hope you can answer the question clearly. If you can't, maybe today can offer some guidance on that journey.
